


It contains many tables and graphs, which are found to be helpful by administrators, faculty, staff, students, and other constituents of the university.

- Provide effective and efficient support and facilities to academic missions and maintain a supportive environment for the university community


About Qatar University

Since its inception in 1973, Qatar University has become the country's national and major institution of higher education. It is comprised of seven colleges: College of Arts and Sciences, College of Business and Economics, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Law, College of Pharmacy, and College of Sharia and Islamic Studies.

Programs offered at the University attract professional recognition through their emphasis on close working links with business, industry, and other professions. At the same time, they emphasize the importance of a solid base of general skills and knowledge through a carefully designed core curriculum, which was conceived with an eye on the needs and requirements of Qatari society and its labor market. The University's teaching and research are innovative, collaborative, enterprising, and flexible endeavors, based on the intelligent use of emerging technologies.

In addition to its notable library, Qatar University boasts a number of support-for-learning centers and units, including an audio library, an e-library, advanced internet facilities, an educational-technology center, advanced video-conferencing facilities, and an active Office for Faculty and Instructional Development.

QU has always strived to fulfill its mission as the country's beacon of knowledge. With seven colleges, over 32,000 graduates, and a faculty community of almost 700 members, the University is also an active participant in several prestigious regional and international associations, including the Union of Arab Universities, the league of Islamic Universities, and the International Association of Universities, to name just a few.



Qatar University offers over 60 specializations - the widest range in the country - and boasts substantial research and academic infrastructure, as well as its reputation as a leading center for research

in the country. As a result, QU has been successful in attracting a large number of distinguished scholars, researchers, and faculty members from other reputable institutions around the world.





A Glance at History

In 1973, having foreseen education as a principle contribution to its expanding society, the Emir of Qatar issued a decree proclaiming the establishment of Qatar's first national College of Education. Among a small population, the college admitted a respectable 57 male and 93 female students in its first year.

After several semesters, rapid development of the country made it necessary to expand upon the College of Education to accommodate new areas of specialization. In 1977, Qatar University was founded with four colleges: Education; Humanities & Social Sciences; Sharia, Law, & Islamic Studies; and Science. In 1980, the College of Engineering was established, followed by the College of Business & Economics in 1985.

At present, Qatar University is comprised of seven colleges; the College of Education, the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Sharia and Islamic Studies, the College of Engineering, the College of Law, the College of Business and Economics and the College of Pharmacy. Special departments such as Environmental Sciences are now being added as individual or joint responsibilities between the colleges, allowing for new and important specializations.

Our Campus

Qatar University is situated on the northern edge of Doha, approximately 16 kilometers from the city center. The location is excellent, and overlooks the coast, the Doha Golf Course, the West Bay Lagoon housing complex, the Pearl, and Al-Wusail commercial and residential development projects on the eastern side. In addition to the main campus, the University has an experimental farm located 65 km north of Doha.


QU's main campus is built on a total area of about 8 square kilometers - with architecture that is distinguished and modern, while reflecting the ideals of traditional Islamic design.

The campus is divided into two adjacent sections, for male and female students. Both sections have their own lecture halls, laboratories, and learning-support facilities, while sharing some services.

QU Strategic Plan

In 2009, QU initiated a university-wide strategic planning process. The Strategic Plan which covers the academic years 2010/2011 through 2012/2013 is a university community product: it took QU faculty, staff and management many months to derive a plan which has been cascaded down to various units.

The plan has four Key Performance Areas that focus on promoting quality education and efficient and effective services. Guided by the University mission and vision, a set of objectives and indicators (Key Performance Indicators, KPI's) have emerged from the work of many committees, meetings, and discussions; with significant assistance provided by an independent external consultant.





Student Counseling Center

The Student Counseling Center (SCC) aims to enhance and enrich students' development, maturity and wellbeing. It provides students with guidance, support and opportunities to develop greater self-understanding to identify and solve problems, and to improve academic performance through the alleviation of psychological, emotional, and cognitive impediments. It also provides consultation initiatives to faculty and staff on issues that pertain to students in order to promote psychological health as a value to the QU community.

Facts from the student counseling center

- 1. 315 students have visited the SCC during the period of Sep 2011 Jun 2012;
- 2. 50% of the students, who came to the SCC, came for getting help with time management, and academic issues;
- 3. 700 students attended the workshops that were conducted by the SCC in 2011-2012;
- 4. About 1216 counseling sessions were conducted by SCC in 2011-2012.










Overall by Country



Alumni Facts

The University leadership places a very high value on the role alumni play in supporting Qatar University's mission, goals and objectives. As part of Qatar University's aim to maintain a strong relationship with its alumni, President Al Misnad recently announced the establishment of the Qatar University Alumni Association.

The Alumni Association is tasked with facilitating members' support of the university by participating in events, admissions recruiting activities, marketing initiatives, and fundraising - all conducted through the chapters that make up the association.

The Alumni Association comprises of chapters, of which there are five types. Chapters can be based on:

- Graduates' Intellectual Home: college/ program
- Graduates' Era at QU: graduation year/ decade
- Graduates' professional/career interests
- Graduates' geographical location/ homeland
- Graduates' interests today beyond their careers

The QU Alumni Association counts over 25,000 alumni as its members, with membership increasing every year. Members can play an active role within the Alumni Association by establishing a new chapter or participating in an existing chapter.

Loyal Members of the Alumni Association are those who have shown a commitment to their university by staying connected to Qatar University past their graduation. This is reflected in many ways including subscription to university publications, attendance at university events, as well as advocacy of university programs and activities. The Qatar University Alumni Association offers numerous benefits to Loyal Alumni who continue to support the university's activities, including complimentary access benefits, VIP invitations to university events and exclusive discounts.

QU has managed to collect/update information for 12,894 of those graduates/ alumni and to increase the total number of "Loyal and Active Alumni" from 1,760

to 4,190 over the course of the last academic year.







Success Percentage per College









Environmental Studies Center

The Environmental Studies Center (ESC) conducts environmental sustainability and environmental impact assessment studies related to many major developments in the country.

The ESC acquired a new research vessel "Janan" which started its first scientific expedition on 5th of June, 2012 to carry out three studies on the conditions of marine ecology in Qatar.

Two studies carried out on this expedition were funded by the National Priorities Research Program (NPRP). The first study was to measure the concentration of mercury in marine life. The second study was to spot the presence of any radioactive contamination in marine life. A third study was in favor of Qatar Petroleum to evaluate the condition of the artificial reefs that surround the island of Haloul.



The Business Operation Department provides a suitable environment for students, teachers and employees by maintaining existing buildings and adding new constructions as needed.

Buildings

New Library Building

Located in males' section. It has been in use since Jan,2012. The New Library Building is used for learning and reading functions. It houses reading halls, study rooms, meeting rooms, an auditorium, display area, stores, some food services and security rooms.

New College of Business / College of Law Building

Located in males' section. It has been in use since 2011. The College of business and Economics – College of law Building is used for learning functions and some students activities. It houses lecture halls, seminar rooms, computer labs, meeting rooms, faculty staff offices, stores, some food services and security rooms.

New Research Complex

Located in men's section. It is still under construction and expected to be finished by 2012. The new Research complex is used for learning, testing, and administrative functions. It is divided into 7 research units and a main administration unit. It houses lecture rooms, auditorium, labs, meeting rooms, staff offices, storage rooms, some food services and security rooms.

New Central Service Unit (CSU) Located in males' section. It has been in use since 2011. The new CSU Building is used for technical and service functions. It houses chillers, transformers, and other control service equipment, machines and security rooms.

Food Court

Located in the women's section, in front of the College of Engineering Building. It has been in operation since March 2009. It is used as a location for fast food services as well as for light entertainment activity. It houses different types of fast food facilities, soft drinks, coffee shop and cafeterias. It has a bookstore, bank, Internet Café and some administrative offices.

Women's Engineering College

Located in the women's section behind the Women's Activities Building. It has been in use since January 2009. The facility is utilized for learning functions, and some students' activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, auditoriums, faculty members offices, meeting rooms, and security rooms.

Men's Engineering College

Located in the men's section in the middle of Qatar University Campus. It has been operational since 1984. It starts from section "F" through section "J". It is used for learning functions and some students' activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, auditoriums, faculty member offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Men's Engineering Workshop Building

Located in the men's section at the end of the College of Engineering (Men). It has been in use since 1984. It is used for learning and facility functions. It houses offices.



Men's Engineering Annex Building

Located in the men's section beside the College of Engineering (Men). It has been in use since 1984. It is used for learning and administrative functions. It houses computer labs and offices.

Men's College of Arts and Science

Located at the men's section in the middle of Qatar University Campus. It has been in use since 1984. It starts from section "A" through section "E". It is used for learning functions and some student's activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, auditoriums, faculty member offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Women's College of Arts and Science

Located at the women's section. It has been in use since 2000. It is divided into 6 sections (starting from section "A" through section "F") and each section serves a branch under the college. It is used for

learning functions and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty members offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Business Operations Department (BOD)

Located in the women's section near the College of Engineering (Men). It has been in use since 1984. It operates most of the systems in the University, it is therefore used for administrative and technical functions. It houses staff offices, labs, port cabins, meeting rooms, workshop, and security rooms.

Information Technology Services (ITS)

Located in the men's section besides the Administration building. It has been in use since 1986. It is committed to collaborate with the Qatar University community to provide excellent information products and services, and enables the University to uphold its high standards in teaching,



learning and outreach. It delivers world class IT services to enable Qatar University to be a model national university that offers a high quality, learning-centered education. It houses staff offices and meeting rooms.

Administration Building

Located in the men's section on the main road. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for administrative functions and instructions. It houses offices and meeting rooms.

Educational Technology Building

Located in the men's section, in front of the College of Arts and Sciences (Men). It has been in use since 1984. It is used for learning functions, and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty members offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Main Men's Building

Located in the men's section beside the College of Arts and Sciences (Men). It has been in use since 1984. It is used for learning functions, and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty member offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Main Women's Building

Located in the women's section besides the College of Arts and Sciences (Men). It has been in use since 1984. It is used for learning functions, and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty member offices, meeting rooms, some food services.

Men's Foundation Building

Located in the men's section at the north end of the campus on the main road. It

has been in use since 2004. It is used for learning and administrative functions, and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty member offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Women's Foundation Building

Located in the women's section to the north and most of the west part of the campus. It has been in use since 2004. It is used for learning functions, and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty member offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

Men's College of Business and Economics

Located at the men's section on the main road just before the Foundation Building. It has been in use since 2001. It is used for learning functions and some students activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty member offices, meeting rooms and some food services.

College of Sharia and Islamic Studies/ College of Law Building

Located in the women's section. It has been in use since 2001. It is used for teaching functions, and student activities. It houses lecture rooms, labs, offices and food services. The third floor is occupied by the College of Business and Economics.

Al Bidaa Building

Located in the women's section. It has been in use since 1995. It is used for learning functions and students activities. It houses offices, labs, and lecture rooms. Part of the building is used as a kindergarten for children and educational training for the students of the College of Education.

Women's Car Parking Building

Located in the women's section. It has been in use since 1993. It is used for service functions. It houses offices and food services. It is considered as a main gate for female students to go to the different women's buildings.

Admission and Registration Building

Located at the northern border of the men's and women's sections. It has been in use since 2003. It is used for administrative functions specially the subject registry and students records. It houses offices.

Arena Pavilion Complex

Located at southeast of the men's section

on the main rood. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for sports and students activities. It houses classrooms, offices, a football stadium and an encircling track. It supports occupation of 5000 people.

Main Court Pavilion

Located in the men's section near Arena Pavilion. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for sport activities. It houses offices and other facilities. It has a capacity of accommodating 900 people.

Tennis Court Pavilion

Located in the men's section on the main road above the Arena Complex. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for sports and students activities. It houses offices,





playgrounds for tennis, handball, and basketball, and security. It has a capacity of 900 people.

Swimming Pool Pavilion

Located in the men's section near the Arena Pavilion Complex. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for sports and students activities. It houses offices, 3 swimming pools, a gymnasium hall, and security rooms. It can accommodate 1500 people.

Men's Library Building

Located toward the north of the men's section. It has been in use since 1990. It is used for facility functions. It houses offices and reading halls.

Women's Library and Exhibition Hall Center Building

Located at the southern border of the men's and women's sections. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for facility functions, and it is considered as the distribution building for the students' textbooks. It houses offices and reading halls.

Mosque (Male)

Located in the men's section. It has been in use since 1990. It is used for religious functions. It houses a prayer hall and service rooms.

Medical Clinic

Located in the women's section beside the

Women's Activities Building. It has been in use since 1998. It is used for treatments and medical functions. It houses offices, testing rooms, and a pharmacy.

Old Central Services Unit

Located in the men's section in front of the Business Operation Department. It has been in use since 1984. The Central Services Unit is used for service functions. It houses service machines such as chillers.

Men's Activities Building

Located in the men's section below the Administration Building. It has been in use since 1986. The Men's Activity Building is used for External Relations and Men's Student Activities, including career services. It houses offices, halls, entertainment facilities and some food services.

Women's Activities Building

Located in the women's section. It has been in use since 1986. The Women's Activities Building is used for Women's Student's Activities, Career Services, the Student Counseling Center, and the Student Learning Support Center. It houses offices, labs, class rooms, entertainment facilities and some food services.

Women's Sports Facility Building

Located in the women's section. It has been in use since 1986. It is used for sports and student activities. It houses a main playground, sports halls, lecture rooms, and some food services.

Bookstore

Located north of the men's section. It has been in use since 2002. It is used for service

functions and houses offices.

Islamic Research Center

Located in the men's section. It has been in use since 2004. It is used for research functions and houses offices.

Research Facilities Buildings

Located outside the campus (Off-Campus), at the original site of the old campus. They have been in use since 1984. They are used for research and testing functions, and houses labs and offices.

Center of Advanced Material

Located in the men's section. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for testing and teaching, and research functions. It houses classrooms, labs and offices.

Central store

Located in the men's section at the junction separating the main road and the road to the women's section. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for service functions. It is the main store in the university and is overseen by the Business Operations department. It houses offices and materials.

Maintenance Store

Located in the men's section. It has been in use since 1984. It is used for service functions and houses offices, stores and workshops.

Chemical Store

Located in the men's section. It has been in use since 1994. It is used for research functions, and houses offices and research labs.



Car Parks
